Responsible disposal of fish gut/offal

Recently, some people disposed of fish gut/offal at the beach at Periwinkle Reef. We would like to inform all anglers that:

- Under the Environmental Protection Act Water Quality, putrescibles (of which fish offal would become) must not be discharged to any waters (oceans)
- In addition, it is an offence under Yorke Peninsula Council By-Law - No 2 of 2020 and this practice is subject to fines by Council.
- This practice attracted a large number of Sting rays, not to mention the possibility of sharks, and as this is a lovely swimming beach for both children and adults we do not want anyone harmed.

Management of vegetation on YP Council Land

Under the *Local Government Act 1999*, Council authorisation is required to undertake vegetation management works (including removal and/or trimming) on Council land, such as reserves and road reserves.

To obtain approval an applicant must submit a request in writing. Before approval is given, Council will refer to all relevant legislation, in particular, the requirements of the *Native Vegetation Act 1991* that provides protection for native vegetation in South Australia.

All signage relating to Port Moorowie's historical background, amenities, flora, fauna & places of interest, the Street Library & First Nations People, have now been completed. New bench seating and table settings have been ordered to replace some seats along the cliff top on Marine Parade.

Some of the main areas that our committee & volunteers have concentrated on again this year have included: Native Coastal Garden, Recycling, Property Checks & General Maintenance of the township.





.....because every picture tells a story

Bush Tucker or bush food is any food that is native to Australia. The Aboriginal people, who have lived in Australia for at least 60,000 years, had a symbiotic relationship with the land and lived off the native flora and fauna for many generations. We have at least 2 plants in our Native Coastal Display Garden that fall into this category.





Kunzea pomifera, (muntries) commonly known as **native cranberries**, is a low-growing or prostrate shrub with hairy stems, small, mostly egg-shaped leaves, groups of white flowers on the ends of the branches and fleshy, more or less spherical, edible fruit.



Billardiera scandens, commonly known as **apple berry or apple dumpling**, is a small shrub or twining plant of the Pittosporaceae family which occurs in forests in the coastal and tableland areas of all states and territories in Australia, apart from the Northern Territory and Western Australia.

They are edible and taste something like cooked apple flesh, with a hint of kiwifruit. They are ready to eat when they ripen to a purplish-green and fall off the plant.

Eaten under-ripe they are quite acidic, and overripe they quickly take on a fermented flavour, so timing is important.

Maintenance Report

It has been another busy time and with the small band of volunteers, particularly Cathie Joseph, who have worked tirelessly we have been able to maintain Port Moorowie, as much as possible.

Despite the low rainfall in the area, the Native Garden has thrived with only a small loss of plants. Pruning, mulching, watering and fertilising is an ongoing task regardless of the types of native plants/trees.



Maintenance hours from December–March has been 83.5 and Property Checks 30 giving a total of 113.5 hours. Thank you to all those people who have contributed precious time to a variety of tasks during this period.

Recycling of cans & bottles is ongoing and brings in much needed funds to the association. Please continue to support us — only 10c bottles & cans. No wine or spirit bottles or rubbish thank you.

Planned tasks for coming months include: mowing the cliff top, spraying the walking trail, replenishing crusher dust on walking trail, weeding the Burial Site, as well as replacing some of the unsafe seats along Marine Parade.

Much of the work that is done is ongoing if we want to keep Port Moorowie a tidy town.

Beach Shelters

The beach shelters at McEachen Beach and Point Gilbert are under construction. We are awaiting the concrete floor to be laid with an accessible ramp for disability access and then an outback table setting with disability seating will be installed. Once all of this has been completed we will arrange for a contractor to paint the shelters to match in with the others and also to help preserve the wood.


Street Library
