
Treasurer's Report..... (excerpt)

We have still managed to maintain a healthy bank balance given our month-to-month expenses as well as providing for some amenities for the township. The only fundraising that we participated in was the online People's Choice Community Lottery. This year we agreed to give a \$1,000 donation to the Royal Flying Doctor Service, an organisation that we significantly rely on to get us to Adelaide in an emergency

Major forms of income this year include: Advertising, Fund-raising, Memberships, Recycling of Cans & Bottles, Donations, Interest, Property Checks & YPC Progress Allocation.

Our expenses have again been exceeding low for the general day-to-day running of the association. Our main day-to-day expenses have been: Defibrillator service, Postage & delivery of Whaler, PO Rental Box, Registration of Trailers and Maintenance.

Maintenance Report

From December 2024 up until now, our small band of volunteers, including Cathie Joseph, Russell Boord, Peter Kirkhouse and John Walton have worked tirelessly with me to maintain Port Moorowie as much as possible to keep the plants thriving during the extremely hot weather and especially when we have virtually had no rain.



Approximately 82.5 hours of work has been carried out during this time. This work includes:

- Watering the NCDG and new rockery
- Mowing of cliff top & whipper snipping edges
- Weeding around water tank mural and NCDG
- Spraying weeds along the walking path
- On-going clearing of Acacia Cyclops, Boxthorns, fallen Platypus tree and fallen dead branches
- Taking prunings to green dump in Yorketown
- Amenity pruning of overhanging bushes
- Cleaning Information Bay
- Checking & refilling doggy bag dispensers
- Recycling of cans & bottles to Stansbury
- Property checks

I know there are other people who do what they can when they are staying in Port Moorowie and I am very grateful for their on-going assistance and support as well.

With the Easter and school holidays fast approaching we ask that you be considerate towards our volunteers.

Our recycling centre is only for bottles and cans which are marked <u>10c SA deposit</u>. We cannot recycle cardboard boxes, wine/spirit bottles, milk bottles or cartons, paper, jam tins, magazines, etc

Please be community minded and if you create waste take it away with you or arrange to use neighbours' bins ready for weekly/fortnightly and/or monthly collection.

Dark Sky Community

Our proposal to become a Dark Sky Community has seen us spend many hours gathering information, reviewing the policy and speaking with the representatives of the Carrickalinga success story.

We have also listened to the many positive comments from you as well as the concerns which have been expressed.

Based on all of the above, we decided at the last Committee Meeting to press on with our desire to preserve the Dark Sky at Port Moorowie but not in an official capacity through the International DarkSky Association (IDA) which has some stringent conditions and on-going commitments which we cannot guarantee that we can fulfil.

We will, however, approach the Yorke Peninsula Council to hopefully develop a Dark Sky Lighting Policy for our township as a vast number of people have indicated that they appreciate the unique quality of night sky that we enjoy and do not want it impacted by artificial light.

Signs will be installed in the BBQ shelter at Periwinkle Reef and the Information Bay indicating what we, as individuals, can do to contribute to a dark sky and why we should be protecting it.

We appreciate that not everyone will be on board but in this day of ever increasing climate change which is vastly impacting wildlife, sea mammals and plants as well as human life we feel strongly that we all have a responsibility to the planet to leave it in a better place than it currently is. Future generations deserve to have a more environmentally sustainable world and we can all do our part to make this a reality.

What impact is light pollution causing?



Birds that migrate or hunt at night navigate by moonlight and starlight. Artificial light can cause them to wander off course and toward the dangerous night time landscapes of cities. Every year millions of birds die colliding with needlessly illuminated buildings and towers. Migratory birds depend on cues from properly timed seasonal schedules. Artificial lights can cause them to migrate too early or too late and miss ideal climate conditions for nesting, foraging, and other behaviours.

Light pollution is among many factors driving a potentially catastrophic decline in some of the world's insect populations. That threat is obvious to anyone who has witnessed moths and other nocturnal insects swarming around bright outdoor lights. If you have insects fluttering around a street light all night, they're depleting their energy reserves to the point of exhaustion, increasing exposure to predators and potentially missing courtship cues from mates.

Bringing back the dark!

The good news is that addressing light pollution has a clear and immediate impact. As soon as you turn that light off, the pollutant disappears from the environment, and species can begin to return.

What's in a Name?

BOOBOROWIE – an aboriginal word meaning 'round waterhole'

COOBOWIE – an aboriginal word meaning 'wild fowl on the water'

CURRAMULKA – an aboriginal word meaning 'a waterhole where emus drink'

KADINA – an aboriginal word meaning 'lizard plain'

MINLATON – from Minlacowie, meaning 'fresh water well'

TIDDY WIDDY BEACH – from an aboriginal word meaning 'bartering place' due to the fact that the Kaurna and Narangga tribes traded in the area

WAROOKA – an aboriginal word meaning 'muddy waterhole'
